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Getting started

Location

Important

Do not place your C42 in the bathroom or other humid areas.

Place your C42 corded base within reach of the AC power outlet and telephone wall jack. The socket-outlet should be installed near the equipment and should be easily accessible.

Make sure it is at least 1 meter away from other electrical appliances to avoid interference. Your C42 works by sending radio signals between the cordless handset and base. The strength of the signal depends on where you place the base. Putting it as high as possible ensures the best signal.

Cordless handset range

The unit has a range of up to 300 metres outdoors when there is a clear line of sight between the telephone base and cordless handset. Any obstruction between the base and handset will reduce the range significantly. With the base indoors and the handset either indoors or outdoors, the range will normally be up to 50 metres. Thick concrete and stone walls can severely affect the range.

Signal strength

||| on your cordless handset indicates that you are within range of the base. When out of range of the base, ||| disappears. If you are on a call, you will hear a warning beep.


If you are on a call, the line will hang up if the cordless handset is moved out of range of the base. Move it back within range. The handset will automatically re-connect to the base.

Setting up

Important


The base station must be plugged into the AC power at all times. Use only the AC power adaptor and telephone line cord supplied with the product.

Connecting the corded base and handset




- Plug the telephone line cord into the socket marked on the rear of the base.
- Plug the AC power jack into the socket marked on the rear of the base and plug the AC adaptor into the AC power outlet. Switch on the AC power.
- 3. Plug the curly cord into the corded handset and the telephone base.

Connecting the charger and charging the handset



- Plug the AC power jack into the socket marked on the underside of the charger and plug the other end into the AC power outlet.
- Remove the battery cover from the back of the handset and insert the 2 x AAA NiMH rechargeable batteries supplied. Please note the '+' and '-' markings inside the battery compartment and insert in the correct direction.



- 3. Slide the battery cover back into place.
- 4. When charging the batteries for the first time, place the handset on the charger to charge for at least 16 hours continuously.
- 5. When the handset is fully charged, will appear steadily on the display. The display will show the handset name and number to indicate that it is registered to the base.

Connecting the cordless handset and charger (for multi-pack only)

If you have purchased a multiple pack, you will need to carry out this process for all the handsets and chargers.

- Plug the AC power jack into the socket marked on the underside of the charger and plug the power adaptor into the AC power outlet.
- Remove the battery cover from the back of the handset and insert the 2 x AAA Ni-MH rechargeable batteries supplied. Please note the '+' and '-' markings inside the battery compartment and insert in the correct direction.
- 3. Slide the battery cover back into place.
- 4. When charging the batteries for the first time, place the handset on the charger to charge for at least 16 hours continuously.
- When the handset is fully charged, will appear steadily on the display.
 The display will show the time and date on the screen, to indicate that it is registered to the base.

Important

Warning! Use only the approved rechargeable Ni-MH battery cells (2 x AAA Ni-MH 550mAh rechargeable batteries) supplied with your C42.

Battery low warning

If \square flashes on the display and there is a warning beep every 2 minutes during a call, recharge the handset before using it again.

When charging, i will scroll on the display.

Battery performance

In ideal conditions, fully charged batteries should give up to 14 hours talk time or up to 200 hours standby time on a single charge.¹

Note that new batteries do not reach their full capacity until they have been put to normal use for several days.

To keep your batteries in the best condition, leave the cordless handset off the charger for a few hours at a time.

Running the batteries right down at least once a week will help them last as long as possible.

The charge capacity of the rechargeable battery will reduce with time as it wears out, giving the handset less talk / standby time. Eventually it will need to be replaced

After charging your cordless handset for the first time, subsequent charging time is about 6-8 hours a day. Batteries and the handset may become warm during charging. This is normal.

Important

When fully charged batteries are removed and re-inserted, the battery icon on the display will reduce to 1 bar. The battery is still fully charged and the handset can be used as normal. If you charge the handset again by replacing it on the charger, it will usually show fully charged after 10 minutes (this time will be dependent on the battery capacity). This is a normal behaviour and is a reminder to charge the handset to prevent calls being dropped.

¹All talk and standby times are approximate and depend on features selected and usage pattern.

Date and time

If you have subscribed to a Caller ID service and Auto Clock is set to on (see page 29), the date and time is set automatically for all handsets when you receive your first call. If Auto Clock is set to off, the time and date does not set automatically.

If you do not have a Caller ID service, you can set the date and time manually.


From the cordless handset

- 1. Press the left \bullet key, scroll \blacktriangledown to **Personal Set** and press the left \bullet key.
- Scroll ▼ to Date & time and press the left key to confirm.
- Enter the date using the format MM-DD-YYYY e.g. 08/27/2021 for 27
 August 2021. Only the last two digits of the year are adjustable. Press the
 left key.
- Enter the time (HH:MM) e.g. 04:30 and press ▲ or ▼ to select AM or PM press the left key to confirm.
- 5. Press ightharpoonup to return to standby.

Your C42 is now ready for use.

2. Getting to know your phone

Overview of your handset

Dial a *

During a call, press to switch from pulse dialing to tone dialing.

G Intercom Press to make internal calls and transfer calls to the corded base or other C42 handsets registered to the base.

Press A to open the phonebook list.

Increase the earpiece or hands-free volume during a call.

Move to the previous character in editing mode.

Back / Redial list / Clear

Go back to the previous menu level.

In standby mode, press to open the redial list.

Press to delete characters and digits when entering names and numbers. Press and hold to remove all characters and digits.

Mute / unmute the microphone during a call.

J Call list / Scroll Down / Volume down

Press T to enter the call list Decrease the earpiece or hands-free volume during a call.

Move to the next character in editing mode.

K End Call / Exit

Press to end a call.

When in a menu, go back to standby mode.

L # / Change case / Pause

Dial a #

When entering letters / editing, press and hold to change the case from Abc to abc or ABC mode.





A Menu / OK

Press to enter the main menu. Select the option displayed on screen. Confirm a menu option.

B Call block

Press to enter the call block menu.

Press to add the incoming call to the block list.

C Find / Intercom

Press to find a lost handset.

Press to make internal calls and transfer calls to the corded base or other C42 handsets registered to the base.

Press and hold for 5 seconds to register the handset to the base.

D Talk / Hands-free

Press to make and receive calls in hands-free mode. Press to switch hands-free on or off during a call.

E * / Pulse to Tone dialing

Dial a *.

During a call, press to switch from pulse dialing to tone dialing.

F Display

G Phonebook / Scroll Up / Volume up

Press to open the phonebook list.
Scroll up through lists and settings.
Increase the earpiece or hands-free volume during a call.

H Back / Redial list / Clear

Go back to the previous menu level.

In standby mode, press to open the redial list.

Press to delete characters and digits when entering names and numbers.

Press and hold to remove all characters and digits. Mute / unmute the microphone during a call.

I Answer on / off

Press to switch the answering machine on / off.

J Stop / Exit

When in a menu, press to go back to standby mode.

C Play

Press to play / stop all answering machine messages.

L Call List / Scroll Down / Volume down

Press to enter the call list.

Scroll down through lists and menus.

Decrease the earpiece or hands-free volume during a call.

M # / Change case / Pause

Dial a #.

When entering letters / editing, press and hold to change the case from Abc to abc or ABC mode.

When dialing or storing a number, press and hold to enter a pause (P).

Navigating the corded base menu

Your C42 has an easy to use system on the cordless handset and corded base.

When the base is in standby:

- 1. From the standby screen, press the left lacktriangle key to open the main menu
- 2. Use ^{va} to scroll up and ^{va} to scroll down through the menu.
- 3. Press the left lacktriangle key to open a sub-menu or validate an option.
- Press the right

 key to correct a character, cancel an action, return to the previous menu level or standby.

Navigating the cordless handset menu

When the handset is in standby:

- 1. From the standby screen, press the left lacktriangle key to open the main menu
- 2. Use \blacktriangle to scroll up and \blacktriangledown to scroll down through the menu.
- 3. Press the left lacktriangle key to open a sub-menu or validate an option.
- Press the right

 key to correct a character, cancel an action, return to the previous menu level or standby.

Note

If you do not press any button on the handset for 30 seconds the display will automatically return to standby. It will also return to standby when the handset is placed on the base or charger.

Using your corded base

3. Using the phone

3.1 Calls

3.1.1 Make a call

1. Lift the corded handset and dial the number.

3.1.2 Preparatory dialing

- Dial the number first. If you make a mistake, press the right key to delete the last digit.
- Lift the corded handset to dial.

3.1.3 Quickdial call

 If you have stored the quickdial numbers, press and hold on the keypad in standby to dial the saved phone number automatically. To set up a quickdial number, see page 26.

3.1.4 Call from the Phonebook, Redial or Calls list

 You can make a call from the Phonebook (see page 25), redial (see page 23) or Calls list (see page 32).

3.1.5 End a call

1. Place the corded handset back on the telephone base.

3.1.6 Receive a call

When you receive a call, the base rings.

Simply lift the corded handset to answer the call.

3.2 Adjust the earpiece volume

During a call, press ⁴ or ⊸ to increase or decrease the volume. There are 5 levels to choose from.

3.3 Mute

You can mute your base so that you can talk to someone nearby without your caller hearing.

- During a call, press the right key on the base. The display shows Mute on and your caller cannot hear you.
- 2. Press the right key on the base again to resume your call.

3.4 Intercom

3.4.1 Make an internal call

You can make internal calls between the base and any cordless handset registered to the base.

- 1. Press INTERCOM on the base.
- Scroll [™]_v to select the handset to be called and press the left key to confirm

3.4.2 Receive an internal call

1. Lift the corded handset to answer the call.

Note

If during an internal call at the base you receive an incoming call, you will hear the alert tone on the base. Place the corded handset on the base to end the internal call. Then pick up the corded handset again to answer the incoming call

3.4.3 Transfer a call

You can transfer an external call from the base to any cordless handset registered to the base.

During an external call at the base:

- 1. Press INTERCOM on the base.
- Scroll ^{vor-} to select the handset and press the left key to confirm.
- When the internal call is answered, place the corded handset on the base to complete the transfer.

Note

Your external call resumes automatically after 1 minute if there is no answer from the cordless handset.

3.4.4 3-way conference call

You can hold a 3-way conference call between 2 internal callers and 1 external caller.

During a call at the base with an external caller:

- 1. Press INTERCOM on the base.
- 2. Scroll $\overset{\text{\tiny ww}}{\blacktriangledown}$ to select the handset and press the left \bullet key to confirm.
- When the cordless handset answers, press the left key to connect all three callers and begin the conference call.
- Place the corded handset back on the corded base and press no the cordless handset to end the call.

Note

If there is no answer on the cordless handset, your external call resumes automatically after 1 minute.

3.5 Hands-free speakerphone

To talk to the caller without holding the handset and for other people in the room to listen to the conversation over the loudspeaker, simply use the handsfree function.

3.5.1 Make a hands-free call

 Dial the number and then press 4: on the base, you will hear the call over the base loudspeaker.

Note

During a hands-free call, press $\frac{\Phi}{2}$ or $\frac{\Phi}{\Psi}$ to adjust the volume. There are 5 levels to choose from.

3.5.2 Answer a call hands-free

1. Press **d**: to answer the call in hands-free mode.

Note

Press **4**: to switch the call between the earpiece and the loudspeaker.

During a hands-free call, press or or to adjust the volume.

3.6 Redial

The last 10 entries dialed are stored in the redial list.

3.6.1 View or dial an entry

- Press the right key to open the redial list.
- 2. Scroll or or or to the entry you want.
- 3. Either lift the corded handset or press $\P \xi$ to automatically dial the selected number.

3.6.2 Copy a Redial list number to the phonebook

- Press the right key to open the Redial list.
- 2. Scroll $\stackrel{\bullet}{\mathbb{Q}}$ or $\stackrel{\circ\circ}{\mathbb{Q}}$ to the entry you want.
- 3. Press the left key, the display shows the selected entry.
- Press the left key, the display shows Save number.
- Press the left key, the display shows Enter name.
- Enter the name using the keypad, if you make a mistake, press the right ● key to delete a character or digit.
- Press the left key, edit the number if necessary.
- Press the left key, the entry is saved.

Note

For information of how to enter the name, see "Entering names" and "Writing tips" on page 25.

3.6.3 Delete an entry

- 1. Press the right key to open the Redial list.
- 2. Scroll or vor to the entry you want.
- Press the left key, if the phone number is stored in the phonebook the display shows **Delete**, if not scroll [®] to **Delete**.
- 4. Press the left key, the display shows Confirm?.
- Press the left key to confirm.

3.6.4 Delete the entire Redial list

- 1. Press the right key to open the redial list.
- 2. Scroll or or or to the entry you want.
- 3. Press the left lacktriangle key. The display shows the selected entry.
- 4. Press the left key, scroll 🚾 to **Delete all,** press the left key.
- 5. The display shows **Confirm?**. Press the left key to confirm.

3.7 Paging / Find handset

You can alert a handset user that they are wanted or locate a missing handset.

Paging calls cannot be answered by a handset.

- 1 Press intercom on the base Scroll **- to select **Locate all**
- 2. Press the left key. All handsets registered to the base will ring.
- To stop the ringing, press NTERCOM on the base again or press any button on the handset.

4. Phonebook

You can store up to 100 names and numbers in the corded base. Names can be up to 16 characters long and numbers up to 24 digits. The base and handset share the phonebook.

4.1 Store a number

- Press the left key, the display shows Phonebook.
- 2. Press the left key, scroll ** to Add new.
- Press the left key, the display shows Enter name.
- 5. Press the left key, the display shows Enter number.
- 6. Enter the number using the keypad, if you make a mistake press the right key to delete a digit.
- 7. Press the left key, the entry is saved.

Entering names

Use the keypad letters to enter names, e.g. to store TOM:

Press 8 once to enter T.

Press 6^{max} three times to enter O.

Press 6 once to enter M.

Writing tips

Press the right ● key to delete the last character or digit.

Press $\mathbf{0}_{\mbox{\tiny RMS}}$ on the base to insert a space.

4.2 View or dial an entry

- Press the left key, the display shows Phonebook.
- Press the left key, the display shows View.
- 3. Press the left \bullet key, scroll $\overset{\circ \bullet}{\circ}$ or $\overset{\circ \circ \circ}{\bullet}$ to the entry you want.
- 4. Press the left key to display the number.
- 5. Lift the corded handset or press **4**: to automatically dial the selected number.

4.3 Edit a phonebook entry

- Press the left key, the display shows Phonebook.
- 2. Press the left key, scroll volume to Edit.
- 3. Press the left key, and scroll or or to the entry you want.
- Press the left key, edit the name.
- 5. Press the left key, edit the number.
- Press the left key, the entry is saved.

4.4 Delete an entry

- Press the left key, the display shows Phonebook.
- 2. Press the left key, scroll 🚾 to **Delete**.
- 3. Press the left \bullet key, scroll $\stackrel{\bullet}{\mathbb{Q}}$ or $\stackrel{\circ\circ}{\mathbb{Q}}$ to the entry you want to delete.
- Press the left key, the display shows Confirm?.
- Press the left key to confirm.

4.5 Delete all entries

- 1. Press the left key, the display shows **Phonebook**.
- Press the left key, scroll vert to Delete all.
- 3. Press the left key, the display shows Confirm?.
- 4. Press the left key to confirm.

4.6 Store a guickdial number

Your phone can store 9 quickdial numbers for key 1 to 9. If a number is stored in the phonebook, it cannot be stored as a quickdial number.

The quickdial number can be up to 24 digits.

- 1. Press the left key. The display shows **Phonebook**.
- 2. Press the left key, then scroll volume to Edit.
- Press the left key, scroll ** or ** to select from 1_ to 9_ at the end of the phonebook list.
- 4. Press the left key, enter the name.
- 5. Press the left key, enter the number,
- Press the left key to save.
- Press and hold on the key on the keypad in standby, the saved phone number is dialed automatically.

Note

If you want to change the quickdial number, follow the first 4 steps in 4.6 above. Delete the number there by pressing the right \bullet key and enter the new number. Then press the left \bullet key to save.

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5. Personal settings

5.1 Sounds

5.1.1 Ring volume

You can adjust the ringer volume and set different volume levels on the corded base. Choose from 5 volume levels or **Off**.

- Press the left key, scroll volume to Personal set.
- 2. Press the left key, Sounds is displayed.
- Press the left key, Ring volume is displayed.
- 4. Press the left key, the current volume level is displayed.
- 5. Scroll ♣ or ♣ to the volume you require and press the left key to confirm

5.1.2 Key tones on/off

When you press a button on the base keypad, you will hear a beep. You can switch these beeps on or off.

- Press the left key, scroll volume to Personal set.
- 2. Press the left key, **Sounds** is displayed.
- Press the left key, scroll volume.
- Press the left key, scroll ♥ to On or Off and press the left key to confirm.

5.2 Language

- Press the left key, scroll vor to Personal set.
- 3. Press the left \bullet key, scroll $\overset{\bullet}{\bullet}$ or $\overset{\circ}{\nabla}$ to the language you want.
- 4. Press the left key to confirm.

6. Advanced settings

6.1 Call block

You can set the phone so that when certain phone numbers call the phone does not ring.

For this feature to work, you must subscribe to Caller ID service from your network operator. A subscription fee may be payable.

You can go to **Call block** by pressing the dedicated ^{BLOCK} ⊗ key on the base, or. through the base menu as described below

6.1.1 Switch anonymous call on/off

You can set the phone so that any call that shows **Private**, **Anonymous**, **Unavailable** or **Out of Area** will not ring.

- Press the left key, scroll v to Advanced set.
- 3. Press the left key, Unknown call is displayed.
- 4. Press the left key, scroll 🕯 or 🖑 to select **On** or **Off**.
- Press the left key to confirm.

6.1.2 Block list

7. Caller ID and the Calls list

7.1 Caller ID

To use Caller ID, you must first subscribe to the service from your network provider. A subscription fee may be payable.

If you have subscribed to a Caller ID service, you will be able to see your caller's number on your base (provided it is not withheld) prior to answering the call. The display can show the last 16 digits or 16 characters of the phone numbers or names.

If your caller's name and number are stored in the phonebook and a number match is found, you will see the caller's name on the display as well. To ensure that the caller's name is displayed, make sure you have stored the full telephone number, including the area code in the phonebook.

If the call is a private call. **Private** will be displayed.

If the number is out of area, Unknown will be displayed.

If the call is from an international number, the number and **International** will be displayed.

If the call is from the operator, Operator will be displayed.

If the call is from a payphone, Payphone will be displayed.

If the call is from a ringback request, Ringback will be displayed.

7.2 Calls list

The Calls list stores details of your last 50 incoming calls, including the phone number and date and time of the call.

The Calls list also alerts you when you have unanswered calls.

The caller's details are stored in the Calls list whether or not you have answered the call. The list is shared by the base and all handsets registered to the base. When the list is full, and a new call is received, the oldest entry will be deleted automatically.

When you have missed call(s) (incoming calls that you haven't answered) the display will show **X** missed call(s) and the $\ ^{\bot}_{X}$ will flash on all handsets registered to the base. Press the left \bullet key to see the callers details.

- Press \(\frac{\circ}{\tau} \) to open the Calls list. If there are no calls in the list, the display shows List empty.
 - The most recent number (and name if stored in the phonebook) is displayed.
- 2. Press or v to scroll through the list.
 - If the call was answered, is displayed as you scroll to the entry. If the
 call was unanswered, x is displayed as you scroll to the entry.
 - If the telephone number is longer than 16 digits, '...' is displayed.

The voice prompt and display tell you the number of the message being played. The date and time the message was left will be displayed on the screen.

The pre-set **Record also** message, that allows your caller to leave a message, is 'Hello, your call cannot be taken at this moment, so please leave your message after the tone'.

8.5.2 Answer only

The caller can listen to your outgoing message but cannot leave a message. The pre-recorded message is 'Hello, your call cannot be taken at this moment, and you cannot leave a message, so please call later.'

8.5.3 Record, play or delete your own announcement

- Press the left key, scroll v to Answ. machine.
- Press the left key, scroll vvvv to Outgoing msg..
- Press the left key, then press ** or *** to select either Answer only or Record also.
- 4. Press the left key, scroll or v or v to select either Play, Record or Use default
- 5. Press the left key to confirm.

8.6 Ring count

Select the duration of rings before your answer machine picks up the call. Choose from 3-8 Rings or **Toll Saver**.

- When set to Toll Saver, if you have new messages, your phone answers after 3 rings.
- If there are no new messages, it will answer after 5 rings. So you have the option to hang up, saying the time and cost of a call.
- If the memory is full, it will automatically revert to Answer only mode.

Note

If Auto answer is switched on, you can simply lift the cordless handset from the charger to answer a call.

9.2 Adjust the earpiece / hands-free volume

During a call, press \triangle or ∇ to increase or decrease the volume. There are 5 levels to choose from.

9.3 Mute

You can mute your handset so that you can talk to someone nearby without your caller hearing.

- During a call, press the right key. The display shows Mute on and your caller cannot hear you.
- Press the right key again to resume your call.

9.4 Intercom

9.4.1 Make an internal call

You can make internal calls between the base and cordless handset, or if you have more than one handset registered to the base, you can make internal calls between two handsets.

- 3. Press the left key, scroll ▼ to On or Off.
- 4. Press the left key to confirm.

11.6 Auto hang-up

Place the cordless handset to the charger to end the call. You can switch this feature on or off.

- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Personal set.
- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Auto hang-up.
- Press the left key to confirm.

Note

If the auto hang-up feature is set to off, you can continue with your call through the speaker mode when you place the handset on the charger.

12. Advanced settings

12.1 Call block

You can set the phone so that when certain phone numbers call, the phone does not ring.

For this feature to work, you must subscribe to Caller ID service from your network operator. A subscription fee may be payable.

You can go to **Call block** through the handset menu as described below, or by pressing the dedicated key on the handset.

12.1.1 Switch anonymous call on/off

You can set the phone so that any call that shows **Private**, **Anonymous**, **Unavailable** or **Out of Area** will not ring.

12.1.2 Block list

You can set the phone so that when phone numbers added to the blacklist call, the phone does not ring. Up to 100 numbers can be added to the blacklist.

Block mode on/off

- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Advanced set.
- 2. Press the left lacktriangle key, scroll lacktriangle to **Call block**.
- 3. Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Block list.
- Press the left key, Block mode is displayed.
- Press the left key, scroll ▲ or ▼ to select On or Off.
- Press the left key to confirm.

Set a call block number

- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Advanced set.
- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Call block.
- 3. Press the left \bullet key, scroll \blacktriangledown to **Block list**.
- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to select from Number 1 to Number 100.
- 6. Press the left key, enter the number you want to block.
- Press the left key to confirm.

Note

When you are storing a phone number in the Block list, you will need to store the full number including the dialing code for the number to be blocked.

If you want to change/delete the block number, follow the first 4 steps above. Then scroll to the slot where the number is stored and press the left \bullet key. Delete the number by pressing the right \bullet key. Then either press the left \bullet key to save no number or enter the new number. Press the left \bullet key to save.

12.2 Area code

The area code must be 3 digits long.

12.3 Flash time

13. Caller ID and the Calls list

13.1 Caller ID

To use Caller ID, you must first subscribe to the service from your network provider. A subscription fee may be payable.

If you have subscribed to a Caller ID service, you will be able to see your caller's number on your handset (provided it is not withheld) prior to answering the call. The display can show the last 16 digits or 16 characters of the phone numbers or names.

If your caller's name and number are stored in the phonebook and a number match is found, you will see the caller's name on the display as well. To ensure that the caller's name is displayed, make sure you have stored the full telephone number, including the area code in the phonebook.

If the call is a private call, Private will be displayed.

If the number is out of area, Unknown will be displayed.

If the call is from an international number, the number and **International** will be displayed.

If the call is from the operator, **Operator** will be displayed.

If the call is from a payphone, Payphone will be displayed.

If the call is from a ringback request, Ringback will be displayed.

13.2 Calls list

The Calls list stores details of your last 50 incoming calls, including the phone number and date and time of the call.

The Calls list also alerts you when you have unanswered calls.

The caller's details are stored in the Calls list whether or not you have answered the call. The list is shared by the base and all handsets registered to the base. When the list is full, and a new call is received, the oldest entry will be deleted automatically.

When you have missed call(s) (incoming calls that you haven't answered) the display will show **X** missed call(s) and the \mathbb{L}^{X} will flash on all handsets registered to the base. Press the left \bullet key to see the callers details.

- Press ▼ to open the Calls list. If there are no calls in the list, the display shows List empty.
 - The most recent number (and name if stored in the phonebook) is displayed.
- Press ▲ or ▼ to scroll through the list.
 - If the call was answered, is displayed as you scroll to the entry. If the
 call was unanswered, is displayed as you scroll to the entry.
 - If the telephone number is longer than 16 digits, press the left key to see the remaining digits.

- Press the left key, Are you sure? is displayed.
- Press the left key to confirm. The number is displayed.

13.2.5 Delete an entry

- Press ▼ to open the Calls list.
- Scroll ▲ or ▼ to the entry you want.
- Press the left key the display shows View.
- Scroll ▼ to Delete.
- Press the left key. The display shows Confirm?.
- Press the left key to confirm or right key to cancel.

13.2.6 Delete the entire Calls list

- Press ▼ to open the Calls list.
- 2. Press the left key, the display shows View.
- Scroll ▼ to Delete all.
- 4. Press the left key. The display shows Confirm?.
- 5. Press the left key to confirm or right key to cancel.

14. Using your Answering Machine

The phone can digitally record up to 25 minutes of messages.

The answering machine can be operated from:

- the base, see page 34
- · the handset, see below.
- · remotely, from any other DTMF telephone, see page 55.

Via the handset

14.1 Switch the answering machine on / off

- Press the left key, select On/off.
- Press the left key, select either On or Off.
- Press the left key. If you select On, press ▲ or ▼ to select either Answer only or Record also.
- 5. Press the left key to confirm.

14.2 Listening to your messages

14.5.2 Answer only

The caller can listen to your outgoing message but cannot leave a message. The pre-recorded message is 'Hello, your call cannot be taken at this moment, and you cannot leave a message, so please call later.'

14.5.3 Record, play or delete your own announcement

- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Answ. machine.
- 2. Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Outgoing msg..
- - If you select **Play**, the current outgoing message will play back.
 - If you select Record, once you hear the beep, speak your message into the handset. To end recording, press the left ● key. The message will play back.
 - If you select Use default, the display shows Confirm?, press the left key to confirm.

14.6 Ring count

Select the duration of rings before your answer machine picks up the call. Choose from 3-8 Rings or **Toll Saver**.

- When set to Toll Saver, if you have new messages, your phone answers after 3 rings.
- If there are no new messages, it will answer after 5 rings. So you have the option to hang up, saving the time and cost of a call.
- If the memory is full, it will automatically revert to Answer only mode.
- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Answ. machine.
- Press the left key, scroll ▼ to Ring count

- 3. Press the left key. The handset will display the current setting.
- Use ▲ or ▼ to select the number of rings required and press the left key to confirm.

14.7 Remote access

You can operate your answering machine from any DTMF phone by calling your product and entering a 4 digit security PIN code.

- Dial your telephone number. When you hear your outgoing message, press *.
