## FCC §1.1307 (b) & §2.1093 – RF EXPOSURE

## **Applicable Standard**

According to FCC §2.1093 and §1.1307(b), systems operating under the provisions of this section shall be operated in a manner that ensure that the public is not exposed to radio frequency energy level in excess of the Commission's guideline.

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According to KDB 447498 D01 General RF Exposure Guidance v06, clause 4.3. General SAR test exclusion guidance:

- c) For frequencies below 100 MHz, the following may be considered for SAR test exclusion (also illustrated in Appendix C):
- 1) For test separation distances > 50 mm and < 200 mm, the power threshold at the corresponding test separation distance at 100 MHz in step b) is multiplied by  $[1 + \log(100/f_{(MHz)})]$
- 2) For test separation distances  $\leq$  50 mm, the power threshold determined by the equation in c) 1) for 50 mm and 100 MHz is multiplied by  $\frac{1}{2}$ 
  - 3) SAR measurement procedures are not established below 100 MHz.

## For worst case:

The SAR Exclusion Threshold Level for 13.56MHz when the minimum test separation distances  $\leq$  50 mm:

= 
$$[474*(1 + log(100/f_{(MHz)}))]/2 = 443mW$$

Use the maximum E-field strength (58.41dBuV/m @ 3m) for the RF exposure evaluation

 $E[dB \mu V/m] = EIRP[dBm] + 95.2$  for distance 3m, so the EIRP=58.41dBuV/m-95.2=-36.79dBm

The maximum tune-up power = -36 dBm = 0.0003mW, which less than 443mW@13.56MHz Exclusion Threshold Level.

So the stand-alone SAR evaluation can be exempted.
